Medical Report of Buddy and Biscuit Bodkin

History:

Date: 19-07-2026 Notes: Buddy and Biscuit were presented on 19-07-2026 for suspected cannabis toxicity. According to the owner, both puppies got into weed. The owner has a brother who is addicted to cannabis and alcohol; apparently, he gave the puppies some cannabis. According to the owner, the same brother killed a dog due to cannabis toxicity two years ago.

The two puppies started to show some symptoms of toxicity after the brother was playing with them.

Clinical Examination:

Biscuit was more affected than Buddy; she was

Ataxic (uncoordinated movement), Lethargic with mildly dilated pupils. Her temperature was 38.2, heart Rate: 160 beats/minute, Respiratory rate: 24 respirations per Minute. She was excessively drooling; her hydration status was Normal, and her mucous membranes were pink and moist.

Buddy showed mild symptoms of toxicity. He was mildly ataxic (uncoordinated movement); his temperature was 37.8, heart rate of 180, Normal hydration status, and pink and moist mucous membranes, good hydration status.

Diagnosis and treatment

The diagnosis is based on a combination of the history, Physical symptoms, and physical examination of the patient

No laboratory tests were conducted to trace cannabis in the organism.

Both patients received activated charcoal to limit the absorption of the cannabis; they also received some intravenous fluid to keep them well hydrated, as they were both vocalizing. I gave them a one-time injection of Midazolam at a lower dose of 0.1 mg/kg

Progress and prognosis

Both patients responded well to supportive treatment; they were bright, alert, eating and drinking well, and all the symptoms of toxicity resolved. The two patients were discharged from the hospital the following morning.
